2020 IRWIN STOCKFEEDS HOOF & HOOK COMPETITION

The 2020 Irwin Stockfeeds Hoof & Hook Competition was run despite not being able to have our highly valued Annual Whittlesea Agricultural Show. Entry numbers were extra good with 74 exhibits. Live Hoof Judging was held on Sunday November 1st with 65 exhibits received under strict Covid-19 regulations, which only allowed a maximum of 10 persons on-site at any one time.

The great help of live judge Rocky Capsciolto, enabled us to run the Hoof Judging at the Showgrounds. Rocky grew up locally at Wollert and his family run several properties in the Goulburn Valley, turning off finished steers & heifers for the local trade. He also transports livestock, specialising in goats out of the Bourke area to Melbourne.

I would also like to thank Hardwicks Abattoir in Kyneton for their co-operation in processing cattle and scoring the carcasses. This is an additional workload for them in a short week and their support is vital for the competition.

Prices are always a talking point and we had the support of Rod Carnegie from Nutrien Ag Solutions in Euroa this year to negotiate, which once again resulted in a fair price for the stock.

Due to not being able to have exhibitors at judging, we decided to do some video and used the Whittlesea Show Facebook page to give some options to view. I would like to thank Kate Henne and Gay Ward for their efforts. Kate has spent a lot of time on this competition and was very willing to provide help to us as requested.

Our Stewards on the day are essential and I thank them very much. David Cocking, Geoff Bichard, Doris Cocking, Anne Cocking, Judy Clements, Andrew Cocking and Daryl Johnson. Ray Atwell once again provided the NLIS scanning, which with his help meant we identified the bodies from the scans as we were unable to be present at the Abattoirs due to regulations. The Show Committee and Secretary have also given their support in running this event.

As we approach the end of another year I would like to thank the Whittlesea Agricultural Society Council, members, sponsors and the community for their continued support through this most difficult year.



FARMER'S CORNER







There is a flurry of activity throughout our district at the moment as farmers take advantage of a good season and the resulting pasture and crops to be conserved for future use.

Local farmers and contractors can be seen hard at work mowing, raking and baling and juggling the weather conditions to produce silage and hay. The bursts of hot conditions interspersed with rain can sometimes pose a challenge for hay making.

Ideally, pasture is cut at its peak, left on the ground to dry, then raked into windrows in preparation for baling. The La Nina patterns of high temperatures, humidity and rain create challenging conditions to work between.

Farmers monitor the weather patterns closely in the hope of timing these activities to produce the best hay possible. However, we are very grateful to be contending with La Nina conditions and not the dry conditions of an extensive El Nino pattern.

POULTRY



Hello, I hope you are all well and enjoying your well-deserved freedom. Hoping you all are having success this breeding season, as I have hatched my first batch of chicken's on Melbourne Cup day.

I am now looking forward to the Poultry Shows, Markets and Poultry auctions starting up, but keeping in mind that we still need to be Covid aware at all events.

Some handy hints for cleansing your bird's digestive system are garlic cloves crushed and put into their drinking water, leave for two days, this is an old European recipe.

Another recipe is to use good quality raspberry cordial (not the cheap brand) and make the mixture to a pink solution and leave for one to two days, this recipe was proven to work for pigs and poultry many years ago and was published in the Weekly Times.

Apple Cider Vinegar is also good to use, I use 20 mLs to 1 litre of water, these keep for one to two days. If it is hot weather, do not leave any of these solutions for any more than one day.

Alternate these solutions, maybe once a month or two, and in between always give your bird's fresh water.



A new poultry club is also in the process of formation, they will gather throughout the year at the Poultry Pavilion at the Showgrounds.

HOMECRAFTS

BECIPE: CASSATA CAKE

2 cups whipped cream

- 1 cup finely chopped glacé fruit (cherries, apricots, pineapple etc).
- 2 tbs sherry
- 2 x 1 litre vanilla ice cream
- 2 tbs cocoa
- 1 packet of milk chocolate melts
- 1/2 packet of shortbread biscuits
- 1. Soak fruit for minimum of 2 hours.
- 2. Add glacé fruit, after soaking, whipped cream.
- 3. Place into a spring form glad wrap lined tin.
- 4. Place in the freezer.
- 5. Soften 1 litre of vanilla ice cream add 2 tbs cocoa, stir through.
- 6. Add 1 pkt milk chocolate melts (melted) and stir through.
- 7. Place on top of cream mixture and freeze.
- 8. Soften 1 litre of vanilla ice cream, pour over chocolate ice cream when frozen.
- 9. Place tin back in the freezer.
- 10. Once frozen, pipe the whipped cream around top of cake and freeze again.
- Crush ½ pkt of shortbread and lightly brown. Sprinkle over cake.
- 12. Freeze until ready to serve.

ANNE GREER - HOMECRAFTS

RECIPE: GINGERBREAD CAKE

350g Treacle7g Ginger150g Butter3g Cinnamon250g Brown sugar3g Nutmeg300g Milk1g Clove7g Bi-carb450g Plain flour

7g Baking powder 1 Egg

- 1. Combine the treacle, butter, brown sugar and milk into a pot and slowly bring to the simmer.
- 2. Whilst the wet mixture is coming up to temperature, mix in the spices and rising agents into the flour so everything is combined evenly. The wet mixture is ready when everything is melted and has become one.
- 3. In either your stand mixture (cake beater attachment) or hand beaters, combine the wet and dry ingredients, when this starts to come together add in your whole egg. Continue to beat the mixture for 10 minutes at a moderate pace.
- Whilst the mixture is beating line a 20 cm round tin, if the tin is shallow, add height with baking paper to ensure it doesn't overflow.
- Bake at 160C (fan forced) for 1 to 1.5 hours, or until the tester comes out clean.
- 6. Allow to sit for at least 10-15 minutes before removing from tin to cool completely.
- 7. Serve simply with a dusting of icing sugar and double cream.

FARM & GARDEN
